
- 1 The first way or musick is for one Bass-Viole to play alone in parts, which standeth alwaies on the right side of this Booke.
- 2 The second musick is for two Bass-Viols to play together.
- 3 The third musick, for three Bass-Viols to play together.
- 4 The fourth musick, for two Tenor Viols and a Bass-Viole.
- 5 The fift musick, for two Lutes and a Bass-Viole.
- 6 The sixt musick, for two Orpheions and a Bass-Viole.
- 7 The seventh musick, to rife the voyce to some of these musicks, but especially to the three Bass-Viols, or to the two Orpheions with one Bass-Viole to play the ground.
- 8 The eight and last musick, is conforting all these Instruments together with the Virginals, or rather with a wide Instrument and the voice.

## Alwaies thus to the Reader.

**I** Doe not studie Eloquence, or prafesse Musicke, although I doe loue  
Sence, and affect Harmony. My Profession beeing, as my Edu-  
cation bath beene, Armes, the onely effeminate part of mee, bath  
beene Musicke; which in me hath bene alwaies Generous, because  
neuer Mercenarie. To praise Musicke, were to say, the Sunne is  
bright. To extoll my selfe, would name my labours vaine-glorious. Onely this, my  
studies are farre from seruile imitations, I rob no otheres inuentiones, I take no ffe-  
lian Note to an English Dittie, or flicke fragments of Songs to stuffe out my vo-  
lumes. These are mine owne Phansies expressed by my proper Genius, which if  
thou doest dislike, let me see thine, Capere vel nolinostra, vele ede tua, Now to  
use a modest shorthenes, and a briefe expreſſion of my ſelfe to all noble ſpirits, thus,  
My Title expreſſeth my bookeſ Contents, which (if my hopes faile me not) ſhall  
not deceiue their expectation, in whose approvement, the crowne of my labours re-  
ſteth. And from henceforth, the ſtatefull instrument Gambo Violl, ſhall with  
eafe yield full various and deuicefull Musicke as any other instrument. For here  
I protest the Trinitie of Musicke, parts, Paſſion and Diuiſion, to be as gracefu-  
ly united in the Gambo Violl, as in the moſt received Instrument that is, which  
here with a Souldiers Resolution, I giue up to the acceptance of all noble diſpo-  
ſitions.


